D. TCCD Monthly Activities and Outreach Report

Gabriael Parker said she did not have much going on in January. We did have an RMC planning meeting. We talked about holding a benefit or battle of the bands of concert, complete with vendors and food truck vendors. Tom Tolbert said he had the perfect site for the event. The concern was the cost of police, fire, and paramedic services. The board said it might not be the best option. Tom mentioned Scott VanLoo talked about doing something on the Arkansas River. He used the example of Rockin' the River in Fort Worth, TX. It is an event where people float on inner tubes in front of a sound stage and listen to music. It would be a great idea since the opening of The Gathering Place. That too would require all emergency services. The board said we could look into planning something like that, but it would require more than a few months to plan. That takes at least a year to plan. Tom said we also talked about hosting the RMC for the 2020 permit requirement for stormwater runoff. He said we could do two half day workshops instead of a full day. This way we would not have to provide lunch. We could still provide CTE's for each session. The board liked that idea in the short-term. Tom said he is going to be very busy until the middle of April. He told Gabriael to set up a planning meeting for the second week of April. Gabriael said she would send that out tomorrow. No further action needed to be taken at this time.

Mileage would be slightly more expensive than the \$94 for the room. It would be about \$115 give or take a few miles. The board agreed. 

Gathering Rain

Rain is not grown in a garden, but it can be managed in one. Rain gardens are a planted depression in the ground designed to help control pollution and reduce soil erosion by gathering rainwater.

Rainwater picks-up pollutants as it flows through urban areas. Rain gardens catch and clean the rainwater before the pollution reaches local streams.

Gathering and slowing the rain also reduces a large flow of water to waterways. Less water equals less erosion.



Protecting Resources

Rain gardens use plants native to Oklahoma. Since native Oklahoma plants tolerate wet and dry periods, watering is only needed during the most severe droughts.

Rain gardens protect precious water resources rain or shine:

No pesticides — native plants are resistant to local pests.

No fertilizers — native plants have low nutrient needs.

Less insecticides — rain gardens drain within a day, reducing mosquito populations

Understanding Pollination

Love flowers? Enjoy eating fruits? Thank a pollinator! Fruits and seeds are produced through pollination, when the pollen from the stamen of a flower fertilizes the stigma of the same or another flower.

Animals pollinate 80-90% of all flowering plants. Pollinators deposit pollen as they move from flower to flower. Without pollinators, many of the foods humans eat would not exist. Almonds, tomatoes, beans, and apples are just a few of the foods that depend on pollinators.







Pollen is picked up from the stamen as butterflies land to collect nectar.



They then fly to another flower of the same type.

Once there, the pollen is deposited on the stigma and the flower is pollinated.

Threats to pollinators are increasing throughout the world. Planting a pollinator garden helps everyone.

Attracting Pollinators

The best way to attract pollinators is to provide a nesting place along with pollinator gardens since both the plants and the animals are adapted to flowers for nectar and pollen. Native plants are the best choice for help each other and pesticides are typically not required.

keeping Pollinators

Pollinator gardens need a variety of nectar and pollen sources. Plant a garden with a wide range of flower shapes, sizes, colors and fragrances.

Tips:

Butterflies need flat, open flowers to land.

Hummingbirds require tubular flowers for their long beaks.

Nocturnal moths and bats are drawn to fragrant flowers.

Bees prefer blue, purple, white, and yellow flowers.

Butterflies are least attracted to blue and green flowers.







They also grow slowly, which means less time, pollution, energy and money spent mowing.



Securing funds for conservation programs and districts

Technical Assistance Grants – NACD recently announced a second round of technical assistance grants for conservation districts. Last fiscal year, NACD secured funds from the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), putting \$9 million in the hands of over 150 conservation districts across 45 states and resulting in over 200 positions.

Urban Agriculture Conservation (UAC) Grants Initiative – In November, NACD, in partnership with NRCS, announced a Request for Proposals for the UAC Initiative. Through this initiative, NACD will fund technical assistance for up to 18 conservation districts for one-year projects. In the last two fiscal years, NACD awarded a total of \$3 million in grants to 61 conservation districts in 30 states.

Providing training and resources to help districts accomplish their missions

Conservation Planning Boot Camp – Through an agreement with NRCS, NACD coordinates district employee participation in the agency's Conservation Planning Boot Camp. The three-week training course uses classroom and field experiences to enhance our members' abilities to help landowners conserve, maintain, and improve natural resources. NACD reimburses district employees for ALL training expenses. Visit NACD's website for dates and eligibility.

Stewardship and Education Materials – For more than 50 years, NACD has sponsored a national program to encourage resource stewardship. This year's Stewardship Week theme is "Life in the Soil: Dig Deeper" and will be celebrated April 28 to May 5. Materials are FREE and available to download at NACD's Marketplace.

Your Dues Matter

We've been working very hard to bring you the latest in conservation news, funding opportunities, and outreach materials – all the tools that enable and support conservation.

To meet our goals for this year, we need full member participation! Members Only Website - Your membership dues support the development of materials that strengthen district boards and assist districts with day-to-day operations. Topics include media training, personnel management, conflict resolution, board diversity and program evaluation. At our February 19, 2019 special meeting, the Tulsa County Conservation District Board of Director's voted to make a request for funds from the Tulsa Area Conservation Foundation in the amount of \$7220, to ensure TCCD 's ability to maintain staff and continued assistance to the Tulsa Area Conservation Foundation. We must maintain our partnership efforts together to secure income in these uncertain times as state budget funding remains at previous year levels.

We plan to work with Tom Tolbert with the City of Broken Arrow to hold a fundraiser for TACF and TCCD later this year. With new stormwater permit requirements due out next year, holding an RMC this year seemed unlikely.
