1. Meeting Called to Order:

Chairwoman, Melissa Gray called the meeting to order at 4:09 PM. She noted this was a regular meeting and is held in compliance with the Open Meeting Act, Title 25 of the Oklahoma Statutes, Section 301 and following, as amended. Notice of this meeting is on file with the county clerk's office. The agenda for this meeting was posted on January 11, 2017 in the front window at 6660 S. Sheridan Rd. Suite 120, Tulsa, Oklahoma 74133.

6. Cost-Share Program Year 17:

A. Greg Daubney Update

Gabriael Parker said that we had one participant complete their cost-share practice. Gabriael said Greg Daubney completed his pond at the end of December, and he received his payment on December 27, 2016. We still have three more participants who have not completed their practices, but the completion deadline is not until August. No further action needed to be taken at this time.

Gabriael said she does have a meeting scheduled with Julie Monnot to discuss the Home and Garden Show, but was told Julie had been very sick and may not be able to attend. Whereas, Conservation Districts are authorized under the provisions of 27A O.S. § 3-1-101 et.seq. and 74 O.S. § 581 to enter into this agreement; and,

Whereas, the OCCD and the TCCD desire and are authorized to work together to meet the conservation mandates and purposes of the Conservation District Act and the conservation needs of the citizens of Oklahoma; and

Whereas, the purpose of this MOU is to provide adequate staffing and support to all conservation districts during challenging economic times; and

Whereas, any two or more districts organized under the provisions of the Conservation District Act may cooperate with one another in the exercise of any or all powers conferred in the Conservation District Act; and

Whereas, any two or more districts may engage in joint activities by agreement between or among them in planning, financing, constructing, operating, maintaining and administering any program or project concerned with the conservation of renewable natural resources. The districts concerned may make available for purposes of the agreement any funds, property, personnel, equipment and / or services available to them under the Conservation District Act.

NOW THEREFORE IT IS MUTUALLY UNDERSTOOD that the OCCD and the TCCD shall:

- 1. OCCD will assist TCCD with educational and outreach events when available.
- OCCD will allow Tulsa County residents to use the 6ft No-Till Drill after rental agreement is signed.
 - a. Customer will be responsible for the transportation of equipment to and from the Okmulgee County Conservation District facilities.
 - b. The customer will be required to pay a security deposit of \$300.
 - Only the customer shall keep and maintain the rented equipment during the terms of the rental.
 - d. The Customer is <u>not allowed</u> to repair the No-Till Drill, Customer will need to contact OCCD about repairs.
- 3. The OCCD and the TCCD will partner together on Salt Scar reclamation projects, as needed, and available.
- 4. OCCD and TCCD will assist each other with administrative duties as needed that include but are not limited to: Assisting with board packets, attending board meetings when needed taking minutes, payroll functions, State and Federal tax preparation, daily operations, as well as monthly operations.
- 5. The OCCD Board will reimbursement OCCD employees mileage, unless other arrangements are approved.

Duration

This MOU remains in effect until December 31, 2017. Both parties will we re-visit this agreement every year in January.

Amendment

This MOU may be amended or revised only by mutual agreement of the parties so long as the changes comply with both federal and state laws and regulations. Greetings,

On Monday the Conservation Commissioners approved an additional \$1,000 allocation for each Conservation District. These funds will be available for use for the remainder of FY 2017. Last spring the state required a rescission in agency budgets. The percentage taken out was based on an estimate of revenue coming in to the state. In the end it was determined the reduction was too large. The Commission has held the funds as a precaution against any new budget rescissions this year. If is now our hope and anticipation that no cuts will be necessary before the fiscal year ends in June.

The outlook for next year continues to be bleak. Estimates have shown the state could have a \$800 to \$900 million shortfall. Please remember that any budget cuts from the state will have to be absorbed by all areas of the Commission and Districts. I believe our economy is turning around and tax revenue will begin to increase. The improvement will take time and we all need to do everything we can to insure funding for Conservation in Oklahoma is restored.

Thank you for all the hard work and sacrifice you have made over the last couple of years. The Oklahoma Conservation Districts and Commission have always been known for taking on insurmountable problems and solving them. Now it is our turn to meet the challenge.



OCC Taking Extra Steps to Prevent Spread of Aquatic Nuisance Species

In 2012, OCC water quality monitoring specialists began using decontamination procedures on field equipment used in streams. This adds time at each stream site, but it is worth it. The establishment and spread of aquatic nuisance species in Oklahoma, such as zebra mussels, golden algae, and Didymo, is a concern. For example, zebra mussels were just discovered in Lake Hefner in Oklahoma City. The lake is the primary drinking water supply for the OKC metro area. The mussels damage water

intake structures and potentially pose a multibillion-dollar threat to industrial and public water supplies. They have infested about 20 lakes in Oklahoma by moving through river systems and hitching a ride on boats that are used in several lakes and not properly cleaned. Because they aren't native, aquatic nuisance species can harm populations of native species that compete for resources, posing a threat to the overall balance of aquatic ecosystems. Proactive measures are necessary to prevent establishment and/or the spread of these nuisance species, which is why OCC staff take the time to decontaminate equipment. What can you do? ODWC urges everyone to *Clean, Drain, and Dry* your boats and equipment when leaving

a lake.








Electrofishing to Assess Stream Health

This summer, OCC water quality monitoring specialists Nathan Carter, Leonard Moore, and Wes Shockley used electrofishing to make a fish collection at Big Creek in Nowata CCD at left. In addition to using electric current, the trio also pulled a seine through the creek to ensure the collection would be thorough. As is always the case, they identify, record, and release the fish, keeping only voucher specimens as standard operating procedures dictate. The stream yielded close to 30 different fish species. Each summer this crew utilizes electrofishing on 40 to 60 streams depending on which basin they're in.

Wetlands!

When we hear the word "wetland," most of us immediately think "water." However, to be considered a wetland an area really only needs to hold water at or near the surface for approximately 3 consecutive weeks every other year. In fact, it is the alternating wet and dry periods that make wetlands unique in their plant communities, soil development, and their ability to take in excess nutrients from nearby land and waterbodies. The pictures below show a wetland on the Hulah Wildlife Management Area in Osage CCD during a dry period (left) and a wet period (right). These pictures were taken during the National Wetland Condition Assessment in 2011 and 2016. The Oklahoma Conservation Commission participates in this national survey to help track the health of these important ecosystems across the country.

Why You Should Leave the Leaves

Savvy gardeners know that keeping fallen leaves on their property has benefits.

Traditionally, leaf removal entails: rake leaves into piles (or blast them with a blower), bag the piles and place the bags out to be hauled off to a landfill, or burn them. Yet, this robs your garden, field, or lawn of nutrients while

destroying wildlife habitat. Instead, let fallen leaves stay on your property. Here's why:

Leaves form a natural mulch that helps suppress weeds and fertilizes the soil as it breaks down. Why spend money on mulch and fertilizer when you can make your own?

Removing leaves also eliminates vital wildlife habitat. Critters ranging from turtles and toads to birds, mammals and invertebrates rely on leaf litter for food, shelter and nesting material. Many moth and butterfly caterpillars overwinter in fallen leaves before emerging in spring.

Too many leaves? Compost them!

Slake Test Demo an Attention Getter

OCC's slake test demonstration at the Southern Soil Health Conference in Belton, TX, got a lot of getting attention. Attendees were amazed that glomalin and organic matter hold soil together so well, and how quickly conventional till soil falls apart compared to no-till soil. Districts and NRCS employees: Remember your soil health buckets have slake test kits in them for doing quick and simple demonstrations at farm shows, in the office, or in the field. - **3.** Email nrcsinfo@ok.usda.gov a list of items in your office or barn you believe should be preserved. This list can be as general or specific as you like. It can be as simple as, "we have three big boxes of old slides and photos," or as specific as, "we have the XYZ grass drill, books a, b, and c about conservation, and a signed photo of Hugh Hammond Bennett."

For now, please do not mail in your history finds. The **Conservation History Working Group** will assess the inventory with the assistance of historians and archivists to identify how best to collect and preserve your documents and artifacts. Thank you for helping **Save Our History!**
